

UA Citation Guide - Chicago Manual of Style

Examples below are based on *The Chicago Manual of Style*, 15th ed., located at Z253 U69 2003 Info. Commons Ref. (Earlier editions may be available in the Main Stacks for checkout under the same call number.)

Note the specific punctuation, indentation, and abbreviation.

It is necessary to **alphabetize** a list of citations by author.

Do not indent the first line. If the information wraps onto more than one line, **indent** the next line/s.

EXAMPLES

Book with one author	CMS
Author's last name, First name and Initial. <i>title italics</i> . Publication location: Publishing company, Year. example: Townsend, Robert. <i>The Medieval Village Economy</i> . Princeton: Princeton University Press, 1993.	
Book with an editor	CMS
Editor's last name, First name and Initial, ed. <i>Title italics</i> . Publication location: Publishing company, Year. example: Mcrae, Murdo William, ed. <i>The Literature of Science: Perspectives on Popular Science Writing</i> . Athens: University of Georgia Press, 1993.	
Journal article	CMS
Author's last name, First name and Initial. "Title of the Article." <i>Journal Title italics</i> Volume number (Year): page numbers. example: Yeh, Michelle. "The 'Cult of Poetry' in Contemporary China." <i>Journal of Asian Studies</i> 55 (1996): 51-80.	

Journal article - 3 authors	CMS
<p>Author's last name, First name, Author's First name and Last name, and Author's first name and last name. "Title of the Article." <i>Journal Title italics</i> Volume number, no. issue number (Month or season (if given) Year): page numbers.</p> <p>example:</p> <p>White, Sabina, Andrew Winzelberg, and James Norlin. "Laughter and Stress." <i>Humor</i> 5, no. 3 (1992): 343-55.</p>	

Newspaper article	CMS
<p>Author's last name, First name. "Title of the article." <i>Newspaper Title italics</i> [city, if applicable] day month year, edition if applicable.: page numbers.</p> <p>example:</p> <p>Taylor, Paul. "Keyboard Grief: Coping with Computer-Caused Injuries." <i>Globe and Mail</i> [Toronto] 27 Dec. 1993:A1+</p>	
<p>Note that according to the Chicago Manual of Style, citations to items in daily newspapers are made in the text, and are not necessary to mention in the reference list.</p> <p>example:</p> <p>In the article entitled "Keyboard Grief: Coping with Computer-Caused Injuries," published in the <i>Globe and Mail</i>, 27 December 1993, Paul Taylor noted that...</p>	

Online article	CMS
<p>Author's last name, First name and Initial. "Article title." <i>Article's original source and publication</i> date: page numbers. Database on-line. Product name. URL.</p> <p>example:</p> <p>Lanken, Dane. "When the Earth Moves." <i>Canadian Geographic</i> March-April 1996: 66-73. Database on-line. Available from EBSCOhost, Academic Search Premier http://www.epnet.com/ehost/login.html.</p>	
<p>Note that it is always best to cite the original source of an article unless the article was originally retrieved from an on-line database or other such electronic source.</p>	

Lecture	CMS
<p>Author's last name, First name and Initial (if given). "Title of the lecture." The meeting title. The sponsoring organization (if given). Location. Day Month Year.</p> <p>example:</p> <p>Atwood, Margaret. "Silencing the Scream." Boundaries of the Imagination Forum, MLA Convention. Royal York Hotel. Toronto. 29 Dec. 1993.</p>	
<p>Note that if a lecture is unpublished and won't be published, it is necessary to only cite the lecture in the text.</p> <p>example:</p> <p>During a class lecture on December 12, 1998, Dr. L. Scott noted that...</p>	

Interview	CMS
<p>If the interview is published and/or broadcast:</p> <p>Interviewee's last name, First name and Initial. <i>Title of the interview</i> (if given). Interview (if untitled) with interviewer's name. Radio, TV program, or Journal title. Program producers (if pertinent). Day, Month, Year, edition (if radio, TV, or periodical). Publication location: Publishing company, year (if given). Page numbers (if given).</p> <p>example:</p> <p>Gordimer, Nadine. Interview. <i>New York Times</i>, late ed., 10 October 1991.</p> <p>example:</p> <p>Lansbury, Angela. Interview. <i>Off-Camera: Conversations with the Makers of Prime-Time Television</i>, eds. Richard Levinson and William Link, New York: Plume-NAL, 1986. 82-86.</p> <p>If the interview is unpublished and/or unbroadcast:</p> <p>Interviewee's last name, First name. Interview by interviewer's first and last name. Interview format. Location, date month year. Location of the transcript if applicable.</p> <p>example:</p> <p>Roemer, Merle A. Interview by author. Tape recording. Millington, MD., 26 July 1973.</p>	

Web site	CMS
<p>Author's Last Name, First Name. "Title of the web site." Date Month Year of Publication. URL.</p> <p>example:</p> <p>Kehoe, Brendan P. "Zen and the Art of the Internet." January 1992, http://freenet.buffalo.edu/~popmusic/zen10.txt.</p>	

E-mail	CMS
<p>Author's last name, first name. E-mail to recipient's first and last name, date month year.</p> <p>example:</p> <p>Danford, Tom. E-mail to Terry Craig, 13 September 1993.</p>	
<p>Note that according to the Chicago Manual of Style, e-mail is regarded as personal communication, and therefore ultimately needs only to be cited in the text.</p> <p>example:</p> <p>In an e-mail memo to Terry Craig on the 13th of September, 1993, Tom Danford state that...</p>
